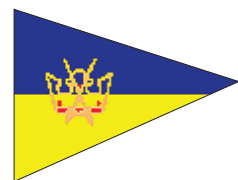

2009 Bottle Boat Championships

Another super radio sailing event! This was despite a little rain at the start and a light and frustratingly variable westerly breeze blowing square across the river Deben from behind Waldringfield Sailing Club. One spectator commented that “the BOTTLE Boat Championship has become an autumn ritual and today it had a lovely colour and atmosphere.”

21 entries from all over the South and one very enthusiastic competitor who flew in specially from Toulouse enjoyed 17 races sailed in a wonderfully light-hearted, yet competitive atmosphere of fun. This was enjoyed as much by many spectators and family supporters as by the competitors. Despite being a strict one design, the fleet of small high performance radio controlled boats made mainly from recycled parts, presented a colourful sight with sails of different recycled polythene bags and 2 litre bottle hulls decorated in a most artistic and colourful way. It brought the whole beach alive.

This year two new Championship trophies were presented. These were specially designed and made by ace 1960's model yachtsman, Fred Shepherd from walnut that blew down in the 1987 October gale. These were both well received by Bernard and Junior Champion, Paul

Morgan. At the prizegiving the Vice Commodore, Howard Ryan, thanked all those who contributed to running the event.

As this event was enjoyed by lots of WSC members, perhaps more racing could be considered on those beautiful sunny winter days where there is nothing happening on the river and a gentle breeze along an empty beach, providing ideal conditions for lots more sport without getting wet.

Endeavour Trophy- Alan Krailing and Edd McArdle 2nd at the Endeavour.



29 classes were represented by their National Champions at this years Endeavour Trophy. As ever the racing took place in the tidal estuary of the River Crouch and comprised 8 races in winds ranging from 6-16 knots. The event is raced in Topper Xenons, a one-design two-man hiking asymmetric dinghy, to provide a fair platform from which the best-of-the-best can be found.

The event started with a training day on the Friday with coaching from Adam Bowers. I'm sure this would have been really useful but after hurriedly rigging and then launching our Topper Xenon we quickly found all the things we hadn't done and spent the session mostly hove-to and re-rigging.

As would be expected, racing was incredibly tight with the smallest mistakes heavily punished. The best opportunity for passing came downwind and it was not uncommon to see boats rounding the windward in the bottom 5 to be in the top 5 by the leeward (and

vice versa!!), especially with a few asymmetric experts from other classes around!

Edd and I made a really good start with a second in the 1st race behind defending champ (and 4 times winner) Nick Craig and Toby Lewis. We narrowly missed out on a win in race 2 finishing 6 seconds behind the RS 800 reps. Another 2nd place in the 5th and final race of the day was enough for the overnight lead on Saturday.

Unfortunately Sunday didn't go completely to plan, missing the upwind gate in race 6 proved to be a costly mistake and with only an 8th in the next race we went into the final race realistically sailing for 2nd place. 5th in the last race following a close battle with eventual winners and now 5 time Endeavour Champion Geoff Carveth and Emma Clarke proved to be enough for 2nd overall ahead of Fireball National Champions Matt Burge and Richard Wagstaff in 3rd.

Waldringfield Lark Challenge Open Meeting

16 Waldringfield Larks welcomed top visitor teams Steve Hall and Ally Dart and Richard Bennett and Rachael Rhodes to join them for the WSC Lark Open over 7/8 November. Speed Sails kindly provided prize vouchers.

The wind was forecast to back all weekend, which it did, starting with a westerly F2-3 on Saturday. The PRO set a simple triangle-windward-leeward course down river of the island. Harry Pynn/ Kathy Neuteboom took races 1 and 3 convincingly, with Christopher Fish/ Beth Condie second. Ian/ Alyson Videlo benefited from those old "Frensham" shift reading skills to take second equal in Race 1. Fish/ Condie in turn used third place prerogative on the last beat of Race 2 to steal victory on the line from long time race leaders Pynn/ Neuteboom, as they duelled with Bennett/ Rhodes who also stole second place.

In an Open of two halves Sunday's races were all won convincingly by Endeavour Trophy runner up helm Alan Krailing but with top local Cadet helm Emma Knott crewing replacing Edd McArdle for the day. Race four was set around a figure of 8 course, beating against the tide, again down

river of the island. Krailing/ Knott caught up from way back by best using the shifts and pressure differences. Hall/ Dart were second and all could only be impressed at how easy Krailing/ Knott made it look.

Races 5 and 6, after lunch, were sailed with more water and returned to a triangle-windward-leeward course. An interesting dilemma was posed by the light SE wind and flood tide. The choice was to either go hard right close to the Waldringfield bank and out of the worst current or stick it out in the channel hoping for a lift on port to leebow the tide and hope the pressure held good. Many places were changed even though it was predominantly a port tack beat. Fish/Condie picked off rivals in front to take second from Bennett/ Rhodes 3rd in race 5. Going into the final race, Fish/Condie had a narrow lead overall with one discard from Pynn/ Neuteboom and Krailing/Knott. Matthew and Emma White led for much of the race pursued by Krailing/ Knott who eventually won through. However, Fish/Condie recovered from a very poor start to third and win overall by the narrowest of margins again. - Chris Fish

Ex Cadet's success
